

THE IDEAL LOCATION FOR THESE CHAMPIONSHIPS — NATHAN BENDERSON PARK

Nathan Benderson Park is one of a handful of sites in the United States identified as having all the natural attributes that make up a world-class rowing, paddling and recreational facility. The park was created from a manmade borrow pit, spring fed with additional surface water holding capacity. The 161.8 hectares (400 acres) of water surface were previously used for mining sand and shell. Since then, the pit was filled by the Cooper Creek drainage basin and the underground aquifer system.

The community park, 243 hectares (600 acres) large, was built to World Rowing racing standards. It boasts 8×13.5 meter

lanes with 50 meters of clear water between the west shore and the course and 27 meters between the wave attenuator and the course. The course is 2,180 meters long, 630 meters wide and, on average, 6 meters deep. In addition, the course has separate warm-up and cool-down lanes. A secure island 12 hectares large (28 acres) is the nerve center of athletic events.

The completed venue consists of a state-of-the-art floating wave attenuator platform that doubles as a dedicated TV road for broadcast requirements, exclusive 3-meter-wide paved coaches' cycle path and a 12-hectare secure event island.

Public Parking: Public parking is in lots at the south end of Nathan Benderson Park, a short stroll or bike ride from Regatta Island. A shuttle will run between the south lots

and Regatta Island. There is a small parking fee. A SCAT bus to the University Town Center (UTC) transfer station, a short walk or bike ride adjacent to NBP along North Cattlemen Road. A shuttle will also ferry spectators to Regatta Island from the bus station and spots in the UTC area.

Oldest, and now FIRST

Philadelphia paddlers are America's oldest team, first to register for Club Crew Worlds

omehow, it's fitting that the first team to register for the Club Crew World Championships is the oldest team in the host country.

The Philadelphia Dragon Boat Assn. was the first to sign on for this summer's event in Sarasota-Bradenton, Fla.

Tommy Leonardi, the president of the Philadelphia club, said the organization began in 1983 when the Hong Kong Tourist Assn. brought the sport to Boathouse Row along the city's Schuylkill River.

The deal, he said, was that "we'll bring you a dragon boat, and paddles and some instruction. If you can get 20-plus people interested, we'll sponsor a trip to Hong Kong and you can come race. And that's how it started."

Fast-forward to July 2022, when the club will represent the United States in premier, senior-B and senior-C categories in standard and small boats for all three distances.

This year's Club Crew Worlds is not only the first to be held in the United States, but the first after the dust began to settle on a global pandemic.

In 1984, Bob McNamara joined the Philadelphia team, and became its coach in 1985. From there, the club has gone on to multiple national and world championships, both in club crew and world nations competition.

"Our members have participated in more World Nations Championships than Club Crews," Leonardi said. "I think our success has a lot to do with the fact that we're the oldest continuing club, and is especially due to us being coached by Bob McNamara, the premier open and mixed coach for Team USA. As a result, we have a very competitive club."

Based on the other side of the Schuylkill from Boathouse Row, the club and other member clubs in the larger Schuylkill Paddlers Inc. organization are a counterpart to the rowing community that shares the same water. Paddlers from the larger organization's other clubs will also be represented in this year's Club Crew Worlds.

The U.S. Dragon Boat Federation (USDBF) Club Crew National Championships in October 2021 was the first time Leonardi's club laid eyes on the Nathan Benderson Park course. But home-water advantage for American teams isn't really on the water, he said.

"The water itself doesn't really matter, because once you're out there on the race course, next to other boats, you could be anywhere in the world and feel exactly the same," he said. "And the reason why is because you practice for that moment so much that once you're at that moment, if you're in Lane 4 in Sarasota or Lane 4 in Pattaya, Thailand, you're in Lane 4 in a dragon boat race."

He said it's not the location, but the preparation that matters. If anything, the advantage is found in that Philadelphia is in the same time zone as Sarasota, so jetlag isn't a factor.

Leonardi, who's also a board member of the USDBF, pointed out travel to the competition will be far simpler.

But when you're at the starting platform, remember that it's time to focus.

"For me, one of the hardest things I had to get used to was focusing on the competition when you're on the water, and not soaking in when you really want to soak in," he said. "When that race starts, and you're surrounded on both sides by multiple boats, when drummers and steers from different countries are all yelling and counting numbers in their native languages, it's pretty cool, but you can't really think about it. You have to make sure you're in your own zone."

Compete as hard as you can, but when you get off the water, walk around and meet people, he said.

"Most people at international races are very friendly," he said. "Stick your head in the tent and say 'hi.' That to me is as good as the racing itself — the opportunities to meet people from other countries. Especially countries that are supposedly your 'enemy.' I can't tell you how many times I've traded jerseys with someone from Iran, China, wherever your enemy is supposed to be. They're all human beings doing the same thing. We might not agree with the leaders of a country, but when you meet the actual people, it really opens your mind to who actually lives in those countries. It's really a beautiful thing."

The first time he went to a Club Crew World Championship, it reminded him of the Walt Disney World ride, "It's A Small World."

"You go from tent to tent and people are wearing all the same colors, different countries, they're speaking different languages, and everyone's typically happy and smiling," he said. "It was like going to Disney World, it was like that ride. And by the way, if they want to ride 'It's A Small World,' it's only a two-hour drive from Sarasota." As the paddling world convenes at Nathan Benderson Park, it gathers at a place that's friendly for athletes to watch their teams compete.

"The tents are right along the race course," he said. "And that's not always the case. It depends on the layout, like in Pattaya, where the tents were past the finish line. If you wanted to watch the races, you had a long walk. They did have a giant screen that you could watch from the marshalling area, which a lot of people did. In Sarasota, you can just look out your tent and it's all right there."

More important to competition is the design of the course itself. Leonardi said the importance of deep lanes can't be understated — and NBP's course has deep, uniform lanes across the entirety of its competition course.

"Dragon boats are quickly affected by shallow water," he explained. "The boats slow down significantly in water that's too shallow. And unfortunately, there have been races in the past at venues that did not have deep water across every lane. And as a result, some lanes would run faster or slower than the others. The other thing that's important is that the course is so wide open that no lane should have an advantage due to wind."

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All that means paddlers competing at Club Crew Worlds will have a fair experience.

"It's a very fair course, and that's so important," he said.
"Think about the amount of time people train in order to get as fast as they can, then the money spent in order to get there. And then if the lanes aren't all the same, it's a real disappointment. That's not something that is a concern at this race course."

As a board member of the United States federation, he says the sport of paddling "has allowed me to live what's really a childhood dream. I get to travel the world while playing a sport. I mean, how many people get to do that?"

"When I'm on some plane going to, say, Thailand to race not only among my teammates but against other countries, it's just an incredible opportunity. And as a result of these amazing experiences, I've always wanted to give back — to my team to my sport. Every year there are always a few new teammates who get to travel to races for the first time. You see the look in their eyes, and it makes you realize to never become too used to this, or too jaded, because it is that special of an opportunity."


